FAYETTEVILLE, NC— This month, H&H Homes broke ground on a custom home that will be donated to Cape Fear Botanical Garden to support the Campaign for Natural Growth. This will be the second home in less than a year that Linda and Ralph Huff, owners of H&H Homes, have donated to a worthy cause.

“The decision to build this house for the Garden was easy as it is consistent with our mission of building better communities,” said Ralph Huff. “The Garden provides an exceptional opportunity for families to enjoy nature in a safe setting. Located at 471 Southampton Court in Browlea Estates, the 2,853 square foot custom home is convenient to all areas of town. It will feature four bedrooms, three bathrooms, a bonus room, screened porch and three-car garage. So far, more than 23 vendors have agreed to donate goods or services to ensure the project’s success. It is expected to be complete in the spring of 2010.
